

"1 DECEMBRIE 1918" UNIVERSITY OF ALBA IULIA was set up as a public higher education and research institution founded pursuant to the Romanian Government Decision no. 474/09.07.1991. Its name is related to the historical moment (1918) when the union of the three Romanian provinces was accomplished in Alba Iulia. In 2009, following the institutional assessment carried out by the Executive Bureau of the Romanian Agency for Quality Assurance in Higher Education—ARACIS, "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia was awarded a HIGH CONFIDENCE RATING, the highest qualification for Romanian universities.

The aim of the university is to constantly develop an academic community, able to increase the value of the archaeological, social, economic and cultural heritage of our region, and committed to creating, preserving and disseminating knowledge, enhancing the academic community's excellence, developing students' skills and competences, through promoting a culture of values, morality, inquiry, research, and life-long learning.

Our University is also committed to continuing the process of extending, modernising and adapting its research and education facilities, and to developing a complex – both theoretical and practical – academic training system for all those who are willing to become highly qualified specialists in different fields of activity, adequately prepared for the ever more demanding and challenging national and international labour market. Therefore, we are permanently improving our undergraduate BA and BSc programmes, as well as post-graduate studies (Master and Ph.D. programmes). The academic programmes are completely aligned with the Bologna system.

"1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia has collaboration agreements with more than 120 research, educational and cultural institutions from Bosnia and Herzegovina, China, France, Hungary, Italy, Malaysia, Mexico, Poland, Republic of Serbia, UK, Ukraine, etc. Most of the agreements are focused on the exchange of students and staff (teaching staff, researchers and administrative staff), exchange of publications, journals and teaching materials, co-organisation of conferences and other academic events, and participation in research and educational projects.







International Relations

"The Centre for International Relations is the pacesetter for the internationalisation strategy of "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia, developed in cooperation with and endorsed by the university management for the current mandate (2012-2016). The main tenets of this strategy are construed along the following lines: extending the international dimension of research activities, and teaching/learning processes, raising intercultural and plurilingual awareness, and active involvement in social and corporate governance."

We actively foster the mobility of teachers and students and we continuously extend our cooperation with institutions worldwide, either through bilateral agreements or collaborating in different types of networks (Association of Carpathian Regional Universities, Consortium in Humanities, European Network for Intercultural Education Activities, etc.).

"1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia has currently concluded 101 Erasmus+ agreements with higher education institutions for student and staff mobility, as well as 50 Erasmus+ agreements with various institutions for student placement. We yearly host a number of approximately 150 outgoing students and 50 incoming students within the Erasmus+ mobility Programme. Our university is in the process of implementing the International Credit Mobility within the Erasmus+ Programme with Partner Countries with whom besides mobility programmes we will develop collaborative educational and research activities, such as: co-organising thematic conferences (GeoCAD, ICTAMI, BENA, etc.), co-publishing periodical volumes of conference proceedings and peer-reviewed academic journals. We have already established successful joint PhD programmes, and we are looking into new vistas offered by ERA+ and Horizon 2020.

For international students, our university provides a one-year programme in **Romanian as a Foreign Language** (Preparatory Year).

Our university consists of 5 faculties (10 teaching departments), 15 research centres and 7 administrative centres.

The Faculty of History and Philology

The Faculty of History and Philology brings together the undergraduate academic programmes in Humanities of our University. The Faculty of History and Philology consists of two large departments: the Department of History, Archaeology and Museology, and the Department of Philology.

The Faculty of History and Philology boasts leading edge facilities for a top-quality educational process: libraries (University Library, Batthyaneum Library, Library of the National Union Museum, National Archives – Alba County), access to databases (e.g. ProQuest, JSTOR, Emerald, Science Direct, Thompson ISI Web of Knowledge, etc.), state-of-the-art laboratories and classrooms, archaeological and restoration sites.

The Faculty has also established partnerships with national and international institutions of higher education. As a result, our students can take part in study and work placement mobility with partner universities in France, Italy, Greece, Germany, Poland, Austria, Spain, Hungary, China, Slovakia, the Czech Republic, Macedonia, Bulgaria, Denmark, Finland, the Netherlands, Norway, Lithuania, Portugal, Turkey, Malta, etc.

DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY, ARCHAEOLOGY AND MUSEOLOGY

The Department of History, Archaeology and Museology (DIAM) was founded in 2010, following the merger between the former History Department (founded in 1991), "Iuliu Paul" Institute of Systemic Archaeology (2001) and "Iuliu Maniu" Centre for Historical Research (1997). The teaching professionals and researchers of DIAM are specialised in Archaeology, Prehistory, Ancient/Medieval/Modern/Contemporary History, Art History, Museology, Heritage Conservation and Restoration.

DEPARTMENT OF PHILOLOGY

The Department of Philology was created in 2011, following the merger between the Department of Romanian Language and Literature (created in 1992), the Department of Foreign Languages (2002) and with three research centres: The Centre of Philological Research and Multicultural Dialogue, The "Speculum" Centre for the Research of the Imaginary and The Centre for Research and Innovation in Linguistic Education - CIEL. The members of the department are specialised in Languages, Literatures and Language teaching methodology. They teach both fundamental philological subjects and modern language courses and Latin in other academic programmes of the University.

CIEL is an accredited preparation and testing centre for Cambridge exams (in collaboration with the British Council, Cluj-Napoca, Romania) and an associate member of the European Confederation of Language Centres in Higher Education -CERCLES. It organizes language certification exams for students who sit in BA, MA, and Ph.D. examinations.

Moreover, it offers modern languages courses, accredited by the Romanian Council for Adult Education and preparation courses for international exams: CAMBRIDGE-FCE/CAE/CPE; IELTS; BEC/ILEC/ICFE, TOEFL, DaF-Zertifikat Deutsch, ZMP-Zentrale Mittelstufenprüfung, ZOP-Zentrale Oberstufenprüfung/TestDaF, DELF and DALF.

The Faculty of Exact Sciences and Engineering is the youngest faculty of the University being founded in 2014 on the basis of the University's Senate decision from 28 April 2014 and of the Government Decision no. 580/2014, published in the Official Gazette of Romania no. 527/16 July 2014, and as a consequence of the development of study and research programmes in technical fields.

DEPARTMENT OF EXACT SCIENCES AND ENGINEERING

The core of the faculty is provided through the Department of Exact Sciences and Engineering, comprising four teaching staff / researchers teams: Computer Science, Electronics, Environmental Engineering, Land Measurements and Cadastre.

Accommodation

Residence Halls

The University has 4 modern Student Residence Halls, with a total capacity of 948 places. The standard facilities and appliances in each Residence Hall include triple bed rooms with modern furniture, bathroom, refrigerator, TV, Internet connection, a launderette, a multifunctional hall, study rooms and kitchens with gas stoves and electric hoods.

The cost of accommodation in the Student Residence Halls is 200 lei (approx. 44 Euro)/person/month. The Centre for International Relations and the Student Services office at "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia will help you apply for accommodation.

Upon request, we can provide assistance to international students who want to rent accommodation in an off-campus apartment. Current real estate market rates will apply (ranging from 125 Euro/month for a studio to 200 euro/month for a 3-room apartment).

The University also has a **Guest House** with 32 rooms (studios and apartments equipped with bathroom, refrigerator and TV), mainly used to accommodate professors from Romania and abroad, as well as delegates for scientific events organised by the University.

The "Gaudeamus" International Study and Conference Centre is the most recently-built complex of the University, designed to host most of its national and international scientific and cultural events. It includes accommodation facilities, conference and lecture rooms with a spectacular view to the green surroundings of Alba Iulia.

The University Restaurant

Students can have lunch at the University Restaurant located on campus with the following facilities: a lunch room with 200 seats, 2 cocktail rooms for special occasions (social events, conferences, and official meetings) with 39 seats; an automatic line for preparing food with modern kitchen appliances. The Restaurant also offers lunch à la carte. The University has a snack bar with an open-air terrace (during summer time), as well as outdoor recreational areas within the historical grounds of Alba Iulia Fortress.

The University Restaurant provides lunch on a regular basis on week days; and breakfast and dinner on request only. A 3-course menu costs approx. 15 lei (3.3 Euro)







The University Library

The University Library is a modern, computerised library with a stock of over 100,000 volumes (together with the Archbishopric Library) that cover almost all fields of interest. The Orthodox Archbishopric Library is located on the premises of the Faculty of Orthodox Theology and provides services which are similar to the ones of the University Library, both sharing a common database.

The Library services are open to all University students, researchers, teaching professionals and administrative staff.

The database of the Library can be accessed through the OPAC software. The library is organised on home loan and reading rooms with over 100 seats, offering free access to the shelf. Access to the Library collections is based on a library card (2 Euros), issued in accordance with Library bylaws.

There are additional services available to the readers in exchange of a small fee.

The library includes four reading rooms with free access to the shelves, located on the first floor of the building, where readers can make photocopies; there is also a loan section, a reading room and the acquisitions and archiving department on the ground floor; a multimedia room is located in the attic of the Library building equipped with 50 computers, where students can check the electronic databases to which the University is a subscribed user. There are digitised teaching/learning materials which students can also purchase.

Students' Health Service

The Students' Health Service aims to provide a positive and unique health care experience for students of "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia. The Practice, located on campus, offers a range of free health service treatment and also additional medical services specifically for student patients. It is open Monday through Friday, from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm.

Students' Sports Centre

Sports facilities

There are two gyms owned by the University available to its students, which are suitable for different sports activities such as: fitness, body-building, football, volleyball, table tennis, basketball, and handball.

CSU Alba Iulia is the University's International Women's Basketball Team playing in the First Division of Romanian Women's Basketball Competitions.

The Students' Union and Cultural Centre

Students can benefit from the cultural, artistic and entertainment facilities and services provided by the Students' Cultural Centre, one of the partner institutions of our University, which hosts and organises cultural events and artistic performances for students and the general public.

Three student and alumni organisations are active within the University: the University Students' Union (LSUA), The Association of Christian-Orthodox Students (ASCOR), and the Alumni Association (ALUMNI). Volunteer work is strongly encouraged and supported by these students' organisations, which organise different events for and with students.

Student Identification Card

International students receive a student ID card that gives them access to various university facilities. The card can also be used to get discounts when purchasing entry tickets to swimming pools, fitness centres, museums, cinemas and public transportation.

Studying at "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia

Students can choose between 28 undergraduate programmes, 24 master study programmes and 4 doctoral degree programmes in Romanian, and 4 undergraduate programmes in English. They are all Ministry accredited, aligned with the Bologna system, and fully compatible with other similar European degrees. The workload of one academic year equals 60 ECTS credits.

Foreign citizens from EU third countries will be enrolled in undergraduate and post-graduate studies only after graduating the Romanian language preparatory year or on the basis of a certificate proving Romanian linguistic competencies; during the preparatory year, the candidates will learn the necessary Romanian language vocabulary as well as the specific vocabulary needed for the future studies (anatomy, physics, chemistry, technical drawing etc.), if the study programme is held in Romanian.

Academic programmes in English

"1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia offers the following degree programmes in English:

Faculty of History and Philology:

Prior to admission to accredited study programmes in English, "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia will organize an English language proficiency test, evaluated with pass / fail. Topics and bibliography will be provided in the Admission Methodology for undergraduate studies, published early for each academic year.

Romanian Language Preparatory Year

Aims and scope

The one-year, full-time academic programme in Romanian as a Foreign Language is addressed to foreign citizens who wish to gain entry onto a Romanian degree programme (at bachelor, master, Ph.D. level), as well as post-graduate and advanced training programmes in various fields. The programme also meets the needs of expatriates who work in Romania and who want to acquire a formal language certification.

The course aims at developing international students' skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking in Romanian for academic purposes. By the end of the course, students will have reached level B2 of the Common European Framework. Besides the 22 contact hours per week, the programme also includes extracurricular activities to ensure that international

students understand Romanian academic life and culture. Various social events, excursions, outings and documentary visits to other cities and tourist attractions are organised regularly to ensure social, linguistic and cultural integration.

Teaching and assessment

This course is taught by a team of experienced scholars and uses varied teaching methods, including lectures, seminars, workshops, and one-to-one tutorials. Students normally have twenty hours of scheduled contact time per week. In addition, staff are available each week for one-to-one tutorials.

Assessment consists of a combination of methods, ranging from assessed coursework, including essays, assignments, creative writing and other tasks; progress tests; oral examinations, including viva voce, individual and group presentations and seminars; individual research assignments, including library projects.

Certification

Students who successfully complete the course and pass the final examination will be awarded a CERTIFICATE OF PROFICIENCY IN ROMANIAN LANGUAGE – B2 LEVEL. The programme is approved by the Romanian Ministry of Education and Scientific Research; therefore certificates are valid across the European Union.

How to apply

Admission requirements for EU students

Citizens from EU, European Economic Association (Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein) and Switzerland who apply for admission in the Romanian educational system have to meet the same conditions as the Romanian citizens and they have the same tuition fees as Romanian students.

In order to obtain recognition of studies, European candidates must send following documents to the university of their choice:

- Filled application form;
- Certified copy of the Baccalaureate diploma;
- Certified copy of the university degree diploma and academic transcript (for master or PhD);
- Personal Identification Documents: Passport (copies of pages 1, 2, 3, 4) / identity card.

These documents have to be accompanied by legally certified translations in an international language (English or French), certified for authentication with the Apostille of Hague.

The certificate recognising the studies will be issued by the National Centre for Equivalence and Recognition of Diplomas (CNERD). The institution will send the certificate to the university within 15 days.

Admission requirements for non-EU students

International students from non-EU Member states who wish to attend the Romanian language preparatory year or a degree programme must comply with the national legislation and "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia Charter.

Application procedure

Prospective students will send the application files directly to "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia. The University will evaluate the files and send to the Ministry of Education and Scientific Research — General Department for International Relations, a shortlist of persons that are nominated to receive the Letter of Acceptance to Studies. Along with the list, the University must send a copy of the applications for issuing the Letter of Acceptance to Studies that were filled in by the candidates. The General Department for International Relations will issue the Letter of Acceptance to Studies and send it to "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia.

Applications are received on a rolling basis, until the end of August for admission to studies in the following academic year. The Letter of Acceptance will be issued by the Ministry of Education by the commencement of each academic year, i.e. 1st of October.

Documents required for the application file:

- 1. Application form (in 2 original copies);
- 2. Certified copy of the High school graduation diploma or equivalent for undergraduate studies;
- 3. Certified copy of the Bachelor's degree or equivalent for postgraduate applicants or PhD;
- 4. Transcript of records translated into Romanian, English, French or German;
- 5. Language certificate (optional);
- 6. Certified copy of the birth certificate;
- 7. Certified copy of the passport valid at least 6 months after the date when the letter of acceptance to studies is issued;
- 8. Medical certificate (in a widespread international language) to prove that the person to be registered for studies does not suffer from infectious diseases or other illnesses that are incompatible with the future profession;
- 9. Four passport-type photos.

Enrolment

When registering, the candidates will present the documents from the Application file, in original, certified for authentication by the Embassy of Romania to the issuer country or endorsed with Apostille of Hague, if the previous studies were not completed in Romania, in a European Union country or in accordance with the legal assistance agreements signed between Romania and third countries.

"Study in Romania" Programme

The Romanian State offers yearly 85 Scholarships to foreign citizens, through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in keeping with Government Decision No 288/1993. These scholarships for under- and post-graduate studies in Romania are granted following a process of selection of application files, jointly organised by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MAE) and the Ministry of Education.

Priority fields: priority will be given to candidates applying for: political and administrative sciences, educational studies, Romanian culture and civilization, journalism, technical studies, oil and gas, agricultural studies, veterinary medicine, architecture, arts, as well as other fields, as requested by applicants.

The scholarship consists of:

- free-of-charge tuition;
- free-of-charge accommodation (depending on availability, accommodation will be offered free-of-charge in students hostels, in keeping with the higher education regulations);
 - financial support a monthly amount representing:
 - the equivalent in Romanian currency of 65 EURO per month, for the under-graduate students (1st cycle);
- the equivalent in Romanian currency of 75 EURO per month, for post-graduate students (master degrees and specialization) 2nd cycle;
 - the equivalent in Romanian currency of 85 EURO per month, for post graduate students (doctor's degree) 3rd cycle.

Enrolment Calendar

The deadline for submitting the application files is established by each diplomatic mission. The candidate should enquire at the diplomatic mission about the enrolment calendar, starting 25 October 2015. All application files should be sent by the Romanian diplomatic missions through the diplomatic courier in such a way that they be registered at MAE no later than 15 February 2016.

The scholarship does not cover subsistence, nor international and local transport fees. The candidates must be prepared to support any other additional expenses themselves.

The selection results will be announced by 30 May 2016 to each diplomatic mission that submitted application files. The scholarship holders will receive a Minister's Matriculation Order to be presented upon registration at the Rectorate of the receiving university.

Entry into the Republic of Romania

The long-stay visa shall only be granted with the approval of the Ministry of Internal Affairs – the Romanian Inspectorate for Immigration.

Foreign citizens having entered the territory of Romania with a long-stay visa may apply for the extension of the right of temporary residence and obtain a residence permit. The request filed in this respect must be addressed to the Romanian Inspectorate for Immigration within the Romanian Ministry of Internal Affairs.

All foreign citizens requiring a Romanian visa shall attach to the duly filled-in and signed application form a valid travel document, acknowledged by the state of Romania, to which the visa sticker may be applied, as well as all the documents required under the law to attest the stated purpose of the trip, the duration of the stay, financial means for the stay, as well as the possibility for the foreigners to return to their home country or continue the trip to a third state, upon the end of their stay in Romania.

As to the states or territorial authorities that are not acknowledged by Romania, visas shall be granted upon request, on standard forms, regulated by the Government Emergency Ordinance No. 94/2008 on establishing measures regarding the issue of electronic passports and of other travel documents.

Long-stay visa for studies

Long-stay visa for studies (marked D/SD), in accordance with Art. 45 from Government Emergency Ordinance no. 194/2002 modified.

- (1) The long-stay visa for studies is granted, upon request, to third-country nationals who wish to enter the territory of Romania as students, or to third-country nationals who partake in pupil-exchange programs.
- (2) Third-country nationals accepted for studies by a state or private education institution accredited or temporarily authorised according to the law, including for participation in Ph.D. courses, are considered as students.
- (3) The visa application must be accompanied by the following supporting documents:
 - a. in the case of students:
 - i. proof of acceptance for studies from the "1 Decembrie 1918" University of Alba Iulia, stating that the third-country national will undeniably attend a full-time degree programme;
 - ii. proof of payment of the tuition fee for at least one year of studies (9 months in advance);
 - iii. proof of the financial means in amount of at least the country minimum net wage / month, for the entire period specified in the visa;
 - iv. a criminal record certificate or another document that bears the same legal value.

Within three business days from arriving in Romania, all foreign citizens must be present and give a written statement at the Alba Iulia Inspectorate for Immigrations, announcing their arrival and estimated period of stay in Romania.

The next step is to obtain a Residence Permit. All of the following are required:

Payment of Consular Fee: 120 Euro

CEC Bank - Residence Permit Fee: 58 Euro

Bank Statement - proof of the financial means in amount of at least 2,500 Euro

<u>Proof of payment of the tuition fee</u>

Fiscal stamp: 5 RON (0.88 Euro)

A copy of original Acceptance Letter + Translation into Romanian

Living in Romania

Beautiful Romania



Romania lies in the Central-South-Eastern part of the European continent. Having a surface of approximately 238,000 square km and a population of 19 million inhabitants, it is one of the medium-sized countries of Europe. Romania's neighbours are Moldova, Ukraine, Hungary, Serbia, Bulgaria and the coasts of the Black Sea.

Romania, a semi-presidential republic, with a bicameral Parliament, joined the European Union in 2007.

The geographical position and the historical evolution of this territory imposed it as an archetype of mixture between cultures relatively differentiated: Western-European, East-European and Balkan. This historical reality was materialised into a special type of general behaviour that manifests itself through tolerance, hospitality and easiness of communication for the people that live here.

The capital of the country is the city of Bucharest, founded in 1459, which has now a population of over 2 million inhabitants. The official language of the state is Romanian, belonging to the Romance family of languages.

Castles & Fortresses of Romania

Biertan Fortified Church, Harman Fortified Church, Bran Castle, Peles Castle in Sinaia, Calnic Fortified Church, Prejmer Fortified Church, Cisnădie Fortified Church, Râsnov Fortress, Corvinesti Castle in Hunedoara, Saschiz Fortified Church, Cristian Fortified Church, Valea Viilor Fortified Church, Dârjiu Fortified Church, Viscri Fortified Church, Făgăras Fortress.

Romania's collection of castles and fortresses perhaps best illustrates the rich medieval heritage of the country. While castles built from the 14th to the 18th centuries are strong and austere fortresses, built mainly for defence against invaders, those erected beginning in the late 1800s are imposing and luxurious. The most popular include the 14th century Corvineşti Castle, built on the site of a former Roman camp, the elegant 19th century Peleş Castle with its 160 rooms filled with priceless European art and, of course, the Bran Castle, built in the mid-1300s.

World literature found valuable sources of inspiration in some of Romania's castles, the most famous novels written on this subject being "The Castle of the Carpathians" by Jules Verne and "Dracula" by Bram Stoker.

As a result, of almost nine centuries of Saxon presence, Transylvania, located in central Romania, claims a cultural and architectural heritage unique in Europe. This region is home to nearly 200 Saxon villages, churches and fortifications built between the 13th and 15th centuries. Seven of the fortified Saxon churches (in Biertan, Câlnic, Dârjiu, Prejmer, Saschiz, Valea Viilor, and Viscri) were designated by UNESCO as World Heritage Sites. A visit to these quaint villages, placed amidst lush farmland and green rolling hills, will give you a glimpse of the long-gone medieval times.

Romania lies in the Central-South-Eastern part of the European continent. Having a surface of approximately 238,000 square km and a population of 19 million inhabitants, it is one of the medium-sized countries of Europe. Romania's neighbours are Moldova, Ukraine, Hungary, Serbia, Bulgaria and the coasts of the Black Sea.

Romania, a semi-presidential republic, with a bicameral Parliament, joined the European Union in 2007.


The geographical position and the historical evolution of this territory imposed it as an archetype of mixture between cultures relatively differentiated: Western-European, East-European and Balkan. This historical reality was materialised into a special type of general behaviour that manifests itself through tolerance, hospitality and easiness of communication for the people that live here.

The capital of the country is the city of Bucharest, founded in 1459, which has now a population of over 2 million inhabitants. The official language of the state is Romanian, belonging to the Romance family of languages. Flag description: three equal vertical bands of blue (hoist side), yellow, and red.

Medieval Cities

Apuseni Natural Park, Bicazului Gorges – Hăşmas National Park, Călimani National Park, Ceahlău National Park, Piatra Craiului National Park, Retezat National Park

Romania's national and natural parks, displaying a unique variety of landscapes, vegetation and wildlife, protect some of the largest remaining areas of pristine forest in Europe. Grasslands, gorges, subterranean caves, volcanic lakes, and an extensive river network add to the richness of the park system that also includes the Danube Delta, a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve and Europe's largest wetland.







The City of Alba Iulia

Historical facts:

Alba Iulia is one of the most important historical sites of Romania.

The city was an important Dacian political, economic and social centre named Apulon, mentioned by the ancient Greek geographer Ptolemy. After the southern part of Dacia became a province of the Roman Empire, the capital of the Dacia Apulensis district was established here, and the city was known as Apulum. It was one of the largest centres in Roman Dacia and the seat of Legion XIII Gemina.

Alba Iulia became the capital of the Principality of Transylvania in 1541, a status held until 1690. It was during the reign of Prince Gabriel Bethlen that the city reached a peak in its cultural history, with the establishment of an academy. Further important milestones in the city's development include the creation of the Batthyanaeum Library in the 18th century, and the advent of the railway in the 19th century.

In November 1599, Mihai Viteazu (Michael the Brave), Voivode of Wallachia, entered Alba Iulia following his victory in the Battle of Şelimbăr and became governor of Transylvania. In 1600, he took control of Moldavia, thereby uniting the three principalities under his rule until his murder in 1601 by Giorgio Basta's agents. His achievement has a historic significance for Romanians, representing the first unification of the three Romanian-populated principalities of Wallachia, Moldavia, and Transylvania.


In 1918, tens of thousands of Romanians and representatives of the Transylvanian Saxons and other minority groups gathered in Alba Iulia on December 1st, now commemorated as the Union Day in Romania, to hear the proclamation of the unification of Transylvania with the Kingdom of Romania. In 1922, Ferdinand of Romania was crowned King of Romania in Alba Iulia, as a symbolic feat which revived the former short-lived achievement of Mihai Viteazu. Ever since, our city has been known as The City of the Unification or The Soul Capital of all Romanians.

Landmarks:

The Roman Catholic Cathedral

Built in the 13th century, the Roman Catholic Cathedral is considered to be an important monument of early Transylvanian medieval architecture. It harmoniously combines Gothic and Roman style elements.

The Reunification Cathedral

The Reunification Cathedral of Alba Iulia was built during 1921-1923 based on a project designed by architect D. G. Stefănescu in collaboration with the engineer T. Eremia. The establishment is built in the shape of a Greek cross. The Great Romanian monarchs King Ferdinand and Queen Mary were crowned here on 15th October 1922.

The Union Museum

The Union Museum of Alba Iulia is one of the finest in Romania. It was originally built for military purposes, the Babilon Building dating since the half of the 19th century (1851-1853). It has two floors and over 100 rooms, and it exhibits over 130,000 pieces of priceless works included in its patrimony.


The Fortress of Alba Iulia (Alba Carolina Fortress)

The Alba Carolina fortress was built between 1714 and 1738 and it is considered to be the most representative of Vauban type in Europe. The fortress was designed by the Italian architect Giovanni Morando Visconti, who worked under the supervision of General Stefan de Steinville and was later completed under General Weiss. The fortification has seven bastions (Eugene of Savoy, St. Stephen, The Trinity, St. Michael, St. Charles, St. Capistrano and St. Elisabeth) that make it into a 7 star-shape, $Vauban-style\ for tress.\ The\ for tress\ is\ the\ most\ important\ baroque\ architectural\ ensemble\ in\ Romania\ and\ Europe.$

The Route of the Three Fortresses

The Route of the Three Fortresses offers the visitors the chance to travel 2,000 years back in time, walking around the old walls of the three fortifications belonging to three different historical periods, successively built on the same location, each new citadel including the previous one: The Roman Camp (106 AD), The Medieval Citadel (16th -17th c.) and the Alba Carolina Citadel, a Vauban-type fortification (18th c.). The route includes visits to: The Minting Factory Gate, South Gate of the Roman Camp (Castrum), the Military Camp, the Access Tunnel to the Artillery Platform, the Artillery Platform, The Guard Room - The Arms Room, The Bethlen Bastion and the Alba Carolina Citadel.

The tourist potential of the area is mirrored by many other numerous traces of millenary history, art and architecture, and the variety and beauty of nature.

Traditional Dishes

Romanian gastronomy is an expression of the geography and history of the country: the landscape diversity provides Romanian housewives with a large variety of fruits, vegetables and spices while the historical neighbourhood of other ethnic groups has left a colourful and tasty mark. Therefore, Romanian cuisine is extremely diverse. In fact it is a mix of different dishes from the several cultures it has come in contact with during its stormy past. However, it has managed to maintain its own character and adapt the foreign recipes to local taste. It has been greatly influenced by Balkan cuisine but it has preserved some influences from other neighbours' culinary traditions, such as the Germans', Serbians', and Hungarians'.

Traditional Romanian spirits are very strong and we can include here the famous pălincă and tuică.

Romania is also a great wine producer. In fact archaeological findings and historical documents place the beginning of wine culture on these lands some 4000 years ago. High quality wines produced in this region were object of trade ever since ancient times. Some of the most important vineyard centres are Dealu Mare, Pietroasa, Drägäşani, Murfatlar, Cotnari, Odobeşti and some of the best Romanian wine varieties include Tămâioasă Românească, Fetească Albă, Fetească Neagră, Jidvei, Galbenă de Odobeşti, Băbească, Busuioacă and many others.


Although each region has its own specific dishes, there are a few characteristics of Romanian traditional cuisine.

Home-made bread - since ancient times, Romanians have been an agrarian society and worshipping agrarian and earth gods came natural to them. That is why cereals like wheat have always played an important role in our life and in our cuisine too.

Polenta (mămăligă) is a very popular Romanian dish made from boiled cornmeal. It is traditionally a slowly cooked dish. It sometimes takes an hour or longer to prepare and constant stirring is necessary. Polenta is considered the peasants' bread – it is thick, but not as consistent as bread.

Soups (supe)—you can find a lot of soup recipes in Romanian cuisine; some of them are clear soups, but some of them are thicker broths which are usually prepared with lots of vegetables and these ones are called ciorbe in Romanian.

Broths (ciorbe) are extremely diverse – one can prepare a ciorba almost from everything. Meat used for **ciorbe** can be of any kind – pork, beef, chicken, lamb – and they usually contain a mix up of vegetables. Ciorbe are usually served with sour cream (smântână) in Transylvania but there are several recipes of broths served with or without sour cream.







Here are some special Christmas dishes, which can be easily found all over the country:

- Cârnați pork-based sausages.
- Caltaboşi a special type of sausages made from pork entrails.
- Piftie pork based jelly (aspic) made of pork and leftover organs (such as ears or snouts), garlic and sometimes vegetables like carrots, string beans.
- Tobă various cuttings of pork, liver boiled, diced and "packed" in pork stomach, similar to salami.
- Sarmale rolls of cabbage pickled in brine and filled with minced meat, rice and various spices and herbs. They can be served with sour cream and/or polenta. These are probably the most well known Romanian dish.
- **Cozonac** a special type of pannetone filled with a walnut squash and/or cocoa, raisins, Turkish delight or with poppy squash (poppy seeds dried, smashed and boiled with sugar and milk).


Easter feast – there is always going to be lamb on the table for Easter! Lamb roast and sometimes lamb soup is eaten on the Easter day.


For Easter there are also "sarmale" and "cozonac" on the table alongside other specialties, such as:


- Drob a cooked mix of intestines, meat (traditionally lamb), eggs and fresh vegetables, mainly green onion and dill
- Ouă roşii (red painted eggs) for Easter Romanians symbolically knock red eggs (hard boiled eggs painted traditionally in red although today people use different colours).
- Pască a nutty kind of cheesecake made only at Easter time!

Leisure

If you want to feel the Romanian party vibe, you can find local clubs and pubs, with different sorts of music, like: house, Latin American, dance, jazz, rock, live music.







Useful information

Healthcare

Health Services and Medical Insurance:

All University students are required to have health insurance for the entire period of their stay in Romania. Due to the fact that international health insurance is not always recognized in Romania, we advise you to get only travel insurance from your country of origin, and once you arrive in Romania, to apply for a Romanian health insurance policy (either public or private), according to the Romanian law.

The cost of a minimum health care package is approx. 10 Euros/month.

Students aged below 26 are exempt from paying for health care services provided by the Romanian public health care system (students' practice, public hospitals or clinics). Please note that all dental care services are paid in Romania (except for emergency dental care in hospitals).

EMERGENCY NUMBER: 112 (Police, Fire-fighters, Ambulance)

Currency

Romania's official currency is LEU (RON), pl. LEI (RON); 1 LEU is 100 BANI.

You can use your foreign debit card at any ATM and you will be issued the equivalent in Lei of the amount you wish to withdraw in US dollars or Euro. Romanian ATMs only accept Visa, MasterCard and Maestro.

Credit cards are widely accepted but you should also have cash available when you go shopping (especially at the food stores and open markets).

Depending on your needs, there are several possibilities for money transfer: postal money order ("mandat poştal"), bank transfer or special transfer (such as Western Union and Money Gram).

Banks

Non-residents have the right to acquire, hold and use financial assets denominated in foreign currency or in the national currency of Romania - Lei.

To open a bank account you usually need a passport or an identity card, and if available, a temporary resident permit.

Some of the commercial banks present in Alba Iulia are: BRD Groupe Société Générale, Raiffeisen Bank, BCR, OTP Bank, City Bank, Banca Transilvania, CEC, Piraeus Bank, etc.

Cost of Living: minimum 120 Euros/month:

Post office

The Romanian Post, Poşta Română, is the national operator in mailing services. It also provides currency exchange, consultancy and transportation services, national and international payments.

Cable TV and Internet

If you live in your own flat, you may have to subscribe to cable and Internet providers. The main companies are UPC, RDS, NextGen, Romtelecom, etc.

The Romanian television offers a wide choice of channels and programmes in English, German, Hungarian, Spanish, French, Turkish, etc. Films are usually subtitled in Romanian, and rarely dubbed.

Electricity

The electricity is 220V / 50Hz.

Shopping in Romania

There is a wide variety of shopping centres, where you can find everything you need for your stay in Romania. Discount periods are mainly in January-February, July and the end of October. For clothing, there are numerous outlet shops, where you can find good quality clothes at reasonable prices. For electronics, you can find shops with a large variety of products (Flanco, Altex, Domo). For furniture and decorations, the most popular stores are Ikea and Bricostore (only in larger cities). The most important hardware stores in Alba Iulia are Dedeman and Ambient. Some of the supermarkets where you can do your daily shopping are Kaufland, Lidl, Dacia, Penny, etc. In big cities and in shopping malls, stores are generally open from 9.am to 22.pm from Monday to Saturday. They are also open on Sundays but close earlier. In smaller towns, many grocery stores are open 24/7.

Phones

Cell phones are widely spread in Romania. Almost the whole country is covered by telephone networks. You can use your home SIM card but be aware of roaming fees when you make a phone call to your home country.

You should unlock your mobile phone before leaving your home country, so that you can use a Romanian SIM card. Cosmote, Orange and Vodafone are three major mobile companies, among others. You can consult their websites or pay a visit to their store to get information about subscriptions, especially if you stay for several months!

To call a Romanian number from a foreign one, you have to add + 40. For example, if you want to call 0721 34 56 78 you have to dial 00 40 721 34 56 78.
